Voting

Each value had a set of value statements, the panelists were asked to choose one statement that resonated with them the most for each value. The panelists were then asked to rank 3/6 values with a 3,2 or 1, with 3 being the most important.

5. History, heritage and culture Value statement: Connection to the land and places of cul	7 pts tural importance
6. Services, shops and amenities Value statement: Secure lifeline services	4 pts
